A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR AZZAM

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

I had in mind a different topic for September, but before I begin writing, I lowered the flag to half-staff in honor of the souls that were murdered and injured in the mass shootings in El Paso, Texas and Dayton, Ohio. Every time something like this occurs, and such events occur far too often...things that should never occur, people will certainly ask the question, where is God. Jesus was asked such a question during his ministry and gave a powerful suggestion as to how we might respond. Here it is for your reading from the last verses of Luke 12 and the first verses of Luke 13

He (Jesus) also said to the crowds, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, you say at once, 'A shower is coming.' And so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, 'There will be scorching heat,' and it happens. You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time? ...

There were some present at that very time who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. And he answered them, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans, because they suffered in this way? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish. Or those eighteen on whom the tower in Siloam fell and killed them: do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others who lived in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish."

Jesus was being reminded of two tragic events. The first was a terrible crime inflicted upon the Jews of Galilee at the time they were making sacrifice in the temple. In response to an uprising, Pontius Pilate had a number of them killed, while they were worshipping. There was so much bloodshed that it pooled together and spilled into the blood of their sacrifices. Pilate not only murdered worshippers but defiled their offerings as well. The second tragedy was the collapse of a tower which fell on 18 people at the pool of Siloam, killing them. This pool was a landmark outside the temple, in the city of Jerusalem...it is where Jesus had once told a blind man to wash the mud from his eyes. Jesus asks, was either the worshippers or these victims any greater sinners than those who were spared. The unspoken answer was, No! But, Jesus continued, unless you repent, you will all likewise perish. Jesus laid the blame on the ones to whom it belonged. All who do not recognize their own sin.

Somehow in our attempts to understand an event...we let ourselves believe that the victims share in the guilt of the perpetrator. And if the victims are believed absolutely innocent...then we blame God. The truth is that we are all guilty of sin, all guilty of death, and only live because of God's grace. The old saying... "But for the Grace of God go I," is likely appropriate here. As long as there is Evil...as long as we live in the world and not in Heaven, people will die at the hands of others, or for simply being in the wrong place at the right time. Such events should remind us to pray, to repent of our own sin, and find comfort and peace in the Grace of God in Christ Jesus who also died at the hands of Pontius Pilate, laying down his life, so that all who believe in him should not perish, but rise with him at the resurrection of the dead.

There is no divine purpose humans will ever be able to surmise when sin rears its ugly head and people die. But like the meaning of the wind and weather we have all learned to read...often better than the meteorologists, we can say that such acts call us to repentance. Such acts remind us that we are all sinners and need the forgiveness of God otherwise we will not just perish but die eternally. Until Jesus returns there will always be tragedies, less, we pray, rather than more, but thanks be to God, He gives us the Victory in our Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Put Your Faith into Action – Get Involved with LWR

Once again, it's time to begin our annual LWR ingathering here at Trinity. LWR is a ministry of the ELCA, LCMS and individuals with partners in 35 countries. Its efforts help people around the world to improve health, provide shelter, improve education, grow or provide food, and assist with disaster recovery. This is an opportunity for us to renew our Christian promise and God's command to help our neighbors in need around the world. Last year, your gifts of love reached 601,144 people around the world. This year LWR expects a 15% increase in requests for Quilts and Kits. LWR knows that this will be a challenge, but with God all things are possible.

Following are the items we are planning to send to LWR this October, and pray you can assist as we minister to our neighbors in need.

Quilts – Quilts are one of the most requested items as they are used to provide shelter, warmth, used as a suitcase and may even serve as a home. LWR sent over 300,000 quilts worldwide in 2018. Come join the Tuesday Quilters at 10:30 a.m., or if you prefer to work at home, you can pick up some precut squares and sew quilt tops at home. They are also accepting new and like-new blankets measuring approximately 60 x 80 and standard twin size blankets.

Personal Care Kits – These are often given to people who must flee their homes quickly during war or disaster. They are also given to refugees to maintain personal hygiene and prevent disease. In 2018 over 190,000 such kits were distributed worldwide. Needed for these kits are dark color bath towels, bath size bars of soap, adult size toothbrushes, sturdy combs and metal nail files. We hope to put together 20 of these kits this year.

Baby Care Kits – In refugee camps, hospitals and remote villages around the world these kits convey a warm welcome to newborns and their moms. In 2018 over 64,445 such kits were sent around the world. Each kit needs 2 wrapped bars of soap, 2 hand towels, 2 infant sleepers, 2 receiving blankets, 2 cotton tee-shirts, 2 pair of baby socks, cloth diapers, and 1 infant jacket or sweater. Thanks to Shirley Ellis and her sewing skills only the soap is needed to complete 50 kits. Therefore, we are in need of 100 bath size bars of gentle soap in original wrapper.

School Kits – These school kits may provide the only supplies children have when returning to school after the disruption of war or a natural disaster. Needed for these kits are: 70-sheet notebooks of wide or college-rule paper, 30-centimeter rulers, pencil sharpeners, blunt scissors, ballpoint pens, box of 16 or 24 crayons, and unsharpened lead pencils. These items will be placed in a specially constructed drawstring backpack that has already been made. We hope to complete 30 school kits.

Again this year, LWR will not be accepting clothing of any kind. The collection of other items will continue until October 10th as items will be taken to Saginaw on October 14th. You will find specially marked boxes in the Parish Hall for your donations.

Cash donations are also appreciated as TLCW/LWR helps support LWR with shipping cost and the purchasing of any items needed to complete various kits. Just mark your envelope "LWR Ingathering" and place in the collection plate.
