A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR AZZAM

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

With this edition of the *Trinity Sonrise News* we embark upon our first indoor worship service since our state's Safer at Home policy was enacted. Though the Governor's executive order never explicitly prohibited worship, non-essential businesses were shut down and people were encouraged to only travel to purchase groceries, visit the pharmacy, or their doctor. Non-essential travel would be construed as a misdemeanor and was punishable by a fine. In order to protect the free exercise of religion clause, the Governor later stated, "We won't enforce fines on people attending church." The possibility of opening churches, however, was greatly curtailed by strict Federal guidelines that doing so for many parishes was impractical.

Now that the Safer at Home policy has been lifted, and other businesses have been allowed to open up, many congregations are holding in person, indoor services under the current guidance which includes distancing, face coverings, limiting common touch items, such as hymnals, and cleaning, cleaning, cleaning. We open because we follow health department guidance because it shows love to our neighbor and it honors those God has placed in authority over us...for our good.

The text for July 5, the Fifth Sunday after Pentecost ironically contains these words of St. Paul:

For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Galatians 5:13-14)

How do we gather together in a time when evidence suggests the possibility of contracting a very contagious and dangerous virus is still somewhat elevated? How do we express our rights as citizens of a nation which protects the right of peaceful assembly and has guaranteed to not interfere with the free exercise of religion while knowing that to do so in enclosed spaces, like the church building, may inflict harm on our neighbor? Who makes that decision and which value is greater?

The Bible also says, "Someone will say, "I am allowed to do anything." Yes, but not everything is good for you. I could say that I am allowed to do anything, but I am not going to let anything make me its slave." (1Corinthians 6:12) Good News Version

When our insistence on exercising our freedom overshadows loving our neighbor, then we show we are slaves to such desire. I may not like wearing a mask in a store or in church, but to protect my brother or sister in Christ I do so, and I stand 6 feet away from them. I may think following health regulations in the Lord's house is a bother, but if I refuse to follow them, I am breaking the 4th Commandment by dishonoring those God has placed over me for my good.

The kid that said to you, this is a free country, I can do what I want to do, was wrong. When the exercise of our freedoms put others at risk, then they are not really free because they are not receiving the same consideration we expect for ourselves. We are simply enslaved to a different tyrant, our sinful nature. God's love has made *us* free to not only worship him, he makes *our neighbor* free to do so without being put at risk. We are not only free to speak about a loving God, but we are called to demonstrate to one another what that Love does by serving and protecting those around us. Jesus sacrificed all so that we might be saved.

Called to Be Stewards



With a few spoken words, God created the world out of nothing. It was God's decision to let us have *"dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth"* (Genesis 1:26). Even though mankind did nothing to deserve this opportunity, we have been given a great honor and

privilege to care for His creation. God trusts us to have dominion over the works of His hands. Our caretaker role gives us purposeful lives.

Once we understand our identity as God's stewards, it changes how we look at everything around us. As stewards, we manage what has been entrusted to us. According to God's will and vision, we are managers not owners. As His stewards, we are to protect and expand what He has given to us.

We are not born stewards. However, by His grace, God transforms us into stewards who seek to follow His ways rather than our own. With changed hearts, we embrace His love and plan for our lives. God empowers us to put aside our need to be owners who are in control as we become His faithful stewards who seek to do His will. The love of Christ controls us. Transformed, we worship the Lord and live lives of faith, love, and obedience rather than living for ourselves.

As the Holy Spirit works in us through Word and Sacrament, transforming us into the image of Christ, we, in turn, will express more of His character. When we believe that God is present in our lives and trust in His power, we will, through faith, apply God's teachings to our lives.

Being a faithful steward is love in action. As Dr. Stephen F. Olford, a 20th Century Christian leader, said, Christ alone owns our eyes to view His world. He alone owns our hands to serve His will. He alone owns our feet to walk His way. He alone owns our minds to think His thoughts. He alone owns our hearts to love Him fervently. He alone owns our personalities to radiate His charm and glory. Failure to recognize this is a refusal to recognize His sovereignty.

May God continue to encourage and equip us to be His faithful stewards who have been shaped by His grace.


Our Lord has cared for His church at Trinity by providing for our financial needs through the generous support of our members during the past months. We are most grateful for this support of your church.
