A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR AZZAM

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

King Solomon wrote in his book of Ecclesiastes that there is a time and season for everything under heaven. Sometimes people know when the time is right, and other times someone tells us. We run into trouble, however, when the announcement of a new time or a new season seems arbitrary, especially when people cannot seem to agree concerning it.

Everyone was ready for 2020 to be over hoping that 2021 would bring a time for finally getting out, a time for rebuilding, and a time for reuniting. What we have discovered however is that certain obstacles seem to still be in the way for all that to happen. We learned last week that the doctors who work at the CDC have come to the conclusion that the various vaccinations are sufficiently effective post two weeks, that fully vaccinated individuals should be able to move about safely without wearing a mask, either indoors or outdoors. And yet there remains many obstacles that prevent us from putting that into practice, especially here at church. We are still, for example, expected to follow social distancing in the building – which means that we must stay six feet away from people who are not in our "social bubble." Friends who are fully vaccinated can sit together, where friends whose vaccination status is unknown or who have not been vaccinated must stay six feet away from each other. On the other hand, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services has announced that we are on a trajectory that would make it safe to increase indoor capacities to 50% across the board with no limits on outdoor gatherings by June 1st. In one month, or on July 1st, we are told, that all restrictions, including mandatory six-foot distancing and mask wearing will be removed except in certain medical settings.

What does this mean for us at Trinity? The Church Council has been following state guidance all along and so that guidance suggests that we are still limited in what we can do together. Socials and dinners indoors may have to wait until July 1st when all restrictions are removed. That being said, some among us may still not feel they are ready to resume every activity as it was before the pandemic. They may still feel more comfortable distanced from others or still with their face covered at worship. While one person might be more than ready to get on with things, another might still be moving forward cautiously.

In the days and weeks ahead, the Church Council will look and listen to what is happening around us, we will seek advice from those who have our best interest and safety at heart, but then finally we will have to decide which benchmarks we will follow in order to fully open up.

As of now, those of you who are not fully vaccinated are still expected to wear a mask at worship and are encouraged to distance yourselves as we have been doing in the pews. Those who believe they are ready to remove the mask and are fully vaccinated are encouraged to sit on the right side of the church. Until capacities change, which seems to be July 1, we will still be required to open every other pew. Please also respect those who may still be more comfortable masked at worship and honor their personal decisions. As the body of Christ, we accommodate one another out of respect for Him who served us and died for us. Let love lead you and be patience during this time as you have been.

Thank you to all of you who have sent cards and gifts to honor my birthday. Thank you also for your prayers and expressions of concern regarding my arm surgery and Kathy's stress fracture of her foot.

STEWARDSHIP

Guided by the Eyes of the Heart

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus spoke about two treasures (Matthew 6:19-20). We either seek "treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal" or "treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal." We are all treasure seekers because we either want to enjoy treasures on earth or treasures in heaven. Our choices, decisions, and actions are dictated by what we hold dear. What we treasure dictates how we think about ourselves and our relationships with others and most important with God.

So, what is your treasure? What causes you to love the treasures or the things of this world or the treasure that God offers? Why do some of us follow one path and others a different one? God gives us two eyes to see, and they are an enormous help for our existence. However, they do not provide help as to which treasure we serve. In his book *Redeeming Money*, Paul David Tripp suggests that we have another pair of eyes and those eyes are eyes of the heart. This set of eyes makes up an important part of our vision system. He wrote:

The eyes of the heart are always envisioning something. They are always fixed and focused on some hope, some dream, something you value. What the eyes of your heart envision will shape what your physical eyes look for and notice. Your physical vision is not neutral. No, it is guided by the eyes of your heart...What, for you, is the treasure dream that shapes the way you see your world? What physical things get your focus because they connect to the treasure that has already commanded the focus of your heart?...The treasures of your heart will always shape the way you see.

Later in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (verse 24). Jesus is telling us that either God or money will be our treasure and become the master in our hearts. We are told that we can't serve both God and money. In this verse, Jesus points out that money above everything else can keep our hearts from making Him their treasure. We can say that no heart is free. As Jesus said, we either seek treasures on earth or in heaven.

As sinful people, our hearts are inclined to seek treasures on earth. Only with God's Word working through the Holy Spirit can the grip that money and material things have on us be broken. In our prayers, let us ask God not only to give us good eyesight, but, more important, to give us even better vision with the eyes of our hearts so that we can clearly see the treasures in heaven which will give us joy and peace on earth and life eternal with Jesus.

Using Church Rooms

In November, the Church Council approved the use of rooms for Bible study groups, quilters, TLCW meetings, etc. The church currently remains unavailable to outside groups or for social functions. PLEASE REMEMBER if you plan to use a room for a church function, you must submit

an updated request form for approval by the Head Trustee. Forms are available in the church office. The person signing the form will be responsible to ensure that the room(s) and restroom(s) are cleaned and sanitized after each usage. A cleaning checklist is attached to the request form, and cleaning supplies are provided. The church adheres to current requirements and/or recommendations of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. At the present time that means that a maximum of 4 people allowed at one time in the quilting room and a maximum of 16 people allowed at one time in the Bible study rooms. Social distancing guidelines must be followed, and facial coverings must be worn by anyone not fully vaccinated. The Church Council will re-evaluate our policies as changes in rules and guidance emerge.
